### OUR MISSION

The Mission Statement of the Board declares that *the Anglican Missions Board enables the Anglican Church in Aotearoa, New Zealand and Polynesia, in a spirit of partnership, to share in the global dimension of Christ's Mission.* It does this by:

-  **Challenging** Christians constantly to enlarge their sense of mission
-  **Mobilising** the Church to pray, give, go and support the global missions of our Church, and to tell mission stories
-  **Partnering and Resourcing** associated Anglican mission agencies, Tikanga mission enterprises, and partner churches, emergency and poverty projects.

### OUR VISION

A primary focus for Anglican Missions is the Anglican Consultative Council's Statement of Mission now incorporated into the Constitution of this Church. Anglican Missions promotes this focus and encourages the church to:

-  **Evangelise:** Proclaiming the good news of the Kingdom
-  **Nurture:** Teaching, baptising and nurturing the Christian Faith
-  **Serve:** Responding to human needs by loving service
-  **Transform:** Transforming the unjust structures of society
-  **Preserve:** Preserving the integrity of creation for future generations.



## A BRIEF HISTORY

The Anglican Missions Board of the Church in Aotearoa, New Zealand and Polynesia (commonly known as *Anglican Missions, AMB, or the Board*) first established by the Church in 1922, is an Incorporated Charitable Trust coordinating the overseas mission of the Church. In 1998 the Board's Canon was reviewed and updated to reflect the 3 Tikanga composition of the Church with AMB's coordination of overseas mission being funded primarily through giving from parishes and rohe, with additional support coming from trusts, bequests and individuals. In 2008 the Board was registered as a charitable entity with the Charities Commission in accordance with the Charities Act 2005.

## LOCAL SUPPORT NETWORKS

Currently Anglican Missions provides Mission Grants and Allocations in support of a wide range of mission activities including: the nurturing and provision of resources for new faith communities; aid and relief work; development projects; clergy support; assistance with church administration; theological training for church leaders; primary health care; education for children; the sending of Mission Partners; and special and emergency appeals. Anglican Missions coordinates multi-cultural mission in partnership with various overseas countries, India, S.E. Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Oceania, and The Pacific.

In presenting this Annual Report, The Anglican Missions Board (AMB) is grateful for the continuing partnership with Tikanga Missions Councils, Diocesan Missions Councils, parishes /rohe, various Church groups, trusts and individuals. Without their support, the sending of Mission Partners, the support of Church Partnerships and Mission Projects would not be possible. **Thank you!**

## A MISSION WE SHARE

We are thankful for the vision, fortitude and hard-work of our many partners in mission, who seek to answer God's call to participate in Christ's Mission. Through them missionaries are sent to foreign lands; churches, schools, and hospitals are built and supported; the poor are affirmed and uplifted particular during tough times; and God's presence is visible in dark places.

To our Provincial church - it never ceases to amaze us how generous and committed you continue to be in supporting the overseas dimension of mission. # OUR WORK

## GRANTS & ALLOCATIONS

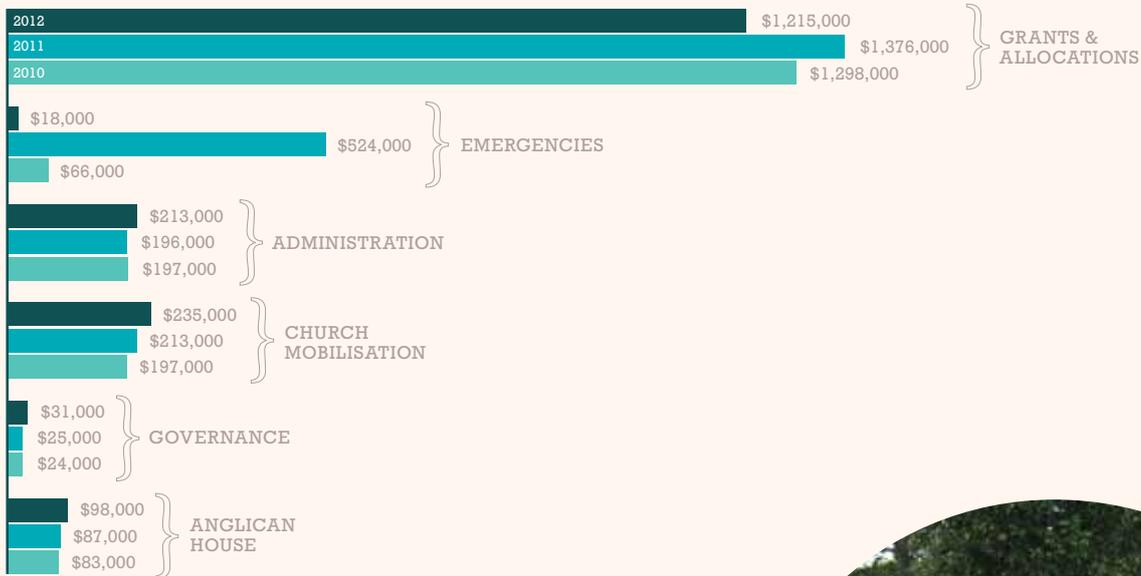
**\$1,215,000 (2011 \$1,376,000)**

Mission Grants and Allocations (excluding emergencies) reduced by \$161,000 from \$1.376 million to \$1.215 million. Grants to Associated Bodies reduced by \$43,000 overall. An increase to NZCMS of \$34,000 was offset by reductions to Papua New Guinea of \$67,000 and SOMA \$10,000 compared to 2011. Donations to Emergency Appeals returned to a more historically normal amount of \$13,000 after the record \$516,000 received in 2011 (due mostly to the Bishops' Christchurch Emergency Appeal).

Other allocations (excluding the Common Life Missions Conference (CLMC) in 2011 of \$126,000) remained constant at \$161,000. Specified Donations were unchanged at \$113,000, while grants to the Tikanga Pakeha Missions Council increased by \$6,000, mostly due to the support they provided for short-term Missions trips, details of which are provided on page 8 in this Annual Report.

### Significant grants went to the work of:

- **NZCMS(\$609,000)** - Anglican Missions' major support continues to go to the New Zealand Church Missionary Society (NZCMS) as it has since the Board's inception in 1922. An Accord between Anglican Missions and NZCMS forms the basis of a partnership between the two entities. \$560,000 was granted to NZCMS in 2012 to support the work of Mission Partners serving overseas and this was supplemented during 2012 by a fundraising initiative "Unite" which raised an additional \$49,000 and which was distributed to NZCMS as a result.
- **The Diocese of Polynesia (\$151,000)** to support various projects including Evangelism, Education, Clergy Support, Health and Development Projects including the resettlement of *Landless People*, *Anglicare*, *House of Sarah* (providing counselling, refuge, and training for women in Fiji), *Outboard Motor*, and *Water for All* projects.
- **The Anglican Church of Papua New Guinea (\$116,000)** supporting Evangelism, Theological Education, Clergy support, Bishops' outreach to remote areas, Health Care and Development Projects.
- **Sharing of Ministries Abroad New Zealand** Due to a leadership interregnum, the \$10,000 grant allocated to SOMA was not drawn down.
- **Tikanga Maori Missions (\$85,000)** supporting the Australian Maori Missions, and further development within the Anglican Indigenous Network.
- **Tikanga Pakeha Missions Council (\$30,000)** supporting Mission Workers in Central Asia, a Tanzanian doctoral student at St John's Theological College and various Short Term Mission Teams.
- **The Church in Melanesia (\$2,000)** for a laptop for the Sunday School Ministry of the Diocese of Banks and Torres.
- **The Episcopal Church in Jerusalem and the Middle East (\$15,000)** for the Ras Morbat Clinic and EpiscoCare Nurseries as part of the 2012 Lenten Appeal. Historically donations for the Anglican Missions Lenten Appeal were divided between the 4 Dioceses in the Province. In 2012 donations for this province went to the *Diocese of Cyprus & the Gulf* and the *Diocese of Egypt & North Africa*. In 2013 support will be for the *Diocese of Iran* and *Diocese of Jerusalem*.
- **The Anglican Church in Tanzania (\$18,000)** supporting the Ministry of the Archbishop and leadership training for new Bishops, Diocesan Secretaries and Development Officers.



## NON GRANT RELATED EXPENDITURE \$577,000 (2011 \$520,000)

As with all mission and aid organisations there is significant expenditure beyond the Grants disbursed. During 2012 the Anglican Missions Non Grant Expenditure totalled \$577,000 which was 32.2% of total income received. Non grant expenditure encompasses all expenditure not distributed on Mission Grants or Allocations and comprises the following:

### Administration \$213,000 (2011 \$196,000)

Essential services to ensure Anglican Missions maintains its high standard of funds accountability and administration.

### Church Mobilisation \$235,000 (2011 \$212,000)

Raising awareness, maintaining the profile of overseas mission, supporting the Church through the provision of resources, holding mission focused events, and providing on-going mission education opportunities. This is a crucial investment in ensuring the Church maintains its focus in overseas mission. A significant piece of work in 2012 was the rebranding of all Anglican Missions Publicity, Communication and Other Resources. Part of Anglican Missions' Strategic Plan for 2010- 2014 focuses on shaping and mobilising the Church, there has been an intentional increase in efforts.

### Governance \$31,000 (2011 \$25,000)

Ensuring that Anglican Missions continues to operate in accordance with the Canon and the aspirations of the three Tikanga. Ongoing work on the Governance structure of Anglican Missions along with costs associated with the Board Chair being based in Fiji, saw a slight increase in costs.



### Anglican House \$98,000 (2011 \$87,000)

The Board regularly reviews the costs and benefits of its 50% ownership of Anglican House, acknowledging that while, as a former Bishop's residence, it is a Taonga of the church, that continued ownership and occupancy must also be seen to be commercially viable. Nevertheless it was still able to generate a small surplus during the year. We continue to be thankful for the provision of an office in such a strategic place in Wellington. The access is easy for all public transport, and we are close to the Diocesan Office and share good fellowship and relationship with the Anglican Church Pension Board. The Board Room at Anglican House is used regularly, both by the Pension Board, Anglican Missions and Anglican Missions partners e.g. TPMC. As an historic building Anglican House experienced a large increase (\$10,600) in insurance premiums during 2012.

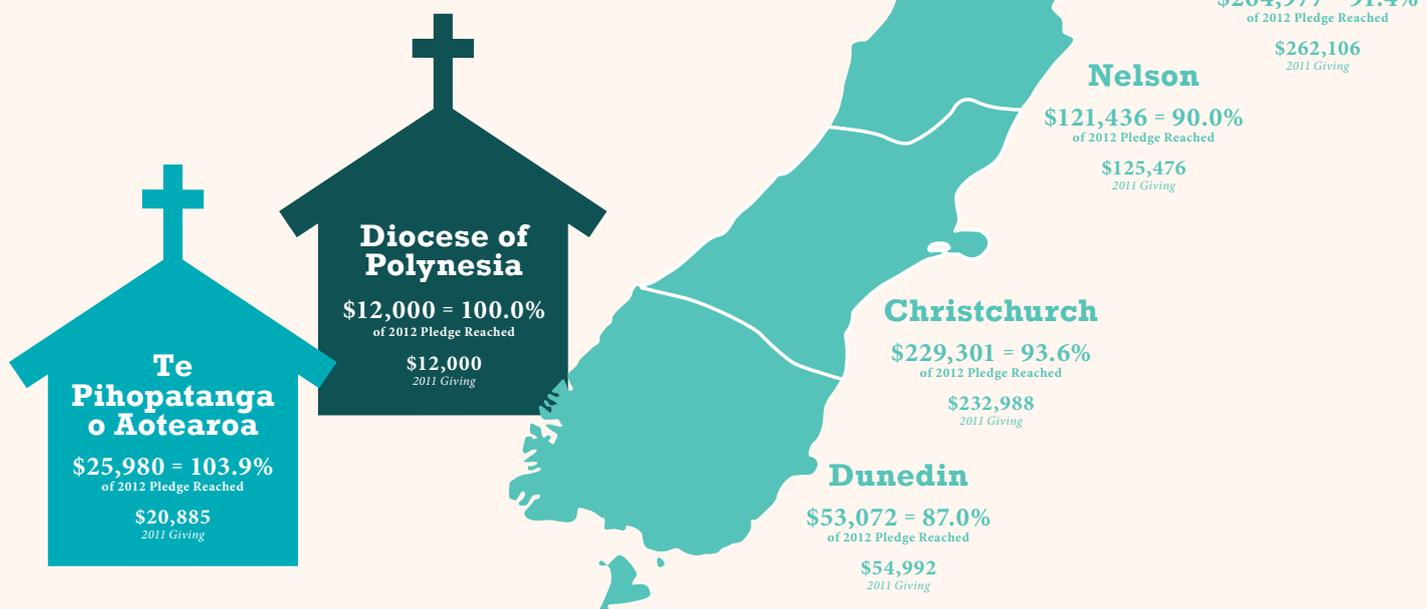
# INCOMING SUPPORT

## 2012 TIKANGA GIVING \$1,334,000 (2011 \$1,332,000)

Anglican Missions funds the overseas mission of the Church primarily through pledged giving from individual parishes/rohe in consultation with Diocesan and Tikanga Mission Councils. Tikanga contributions reached 93.4% of target, with total Tikanga Giving being slightly increased compared to 2011. Waiapu and Wellington Dioceses and Te Pihopatanga all exceeded last year's efforts and Wellington was once again the highest giver in the country. Other Dioceses were very close to what they achieved in 2011 for which the Board is very grateful given challenging economic times.

**Total Tikanga Giving of \$1.334 million** was provided by the Church for the Global Mission work of the Church coordinated by Anglican Missions, an increase of \$1,500 (0.1%) over the previous year's \$1.332 million. 128 Parishes increased their giving from 2011 while 141 reduced and 135 Parishes remained the same.

Over \$32,500 was raised by parishes for Mission Partner Projects.



## SPECIAL THANK YOU

AMB wishes to acknowledge the generosity of donors, in particular the Henry & William Williams Memorial Trust (\$169,000) and the Association of Anglican Women (\$25,000) who continued their long-standing support of Overseas Mission.

## SPECIFIED DONATIONS

These are donor donations received for mission work outside the usual operations of the Board, and transmitted overseas in accordance with the wishes of the donors. These specified donations are recorded as income and expenditure once they are distributed as they represent significant extra giving by the Church. (The donations are processed with no administration charge levied). The sum total of these specified donations, received and distributed in 2012 amounted to \$113,000, the same amount as in 2011.

Of the \$113,000 remitted on behalf of donors in 2012, the main recipients were Polynesia (\$42,100), Tanzania (\$22,500), Papua New Guinea (\$13,000), NZ Church Missionary Society (\$8,700), and Melanesia (\$5,200).

## APPEALS

### Fundraising

The Board continues to grow a database of individuals interested in supporting the work of Anglican Missions directly. In 2012 the expanded **Lenten Appeal** included projects from the Diocese of Polynesia and the joint AMB/NZCMS fundraising initiative Unite. In 2012 \$32,000 was raised from the Appeal.

Anglican Missions ran a fundraising appeal to our individual supporters for the **House of Sarah** in October 2012. \$11,200 was raised from the appeal.

### Emergency Appeals

In 2012 \$13,190 was raised for Emergency Appeals, which was comparable to the funds raised in 2011 excluding the Bishops' Christchurch earthquake appeal.

## BEQUESTS AND LEGACIES

Since the inception of the Board, many individuals have bequeathed sums of money to the Board for the purpose of supporting the Global Mission of the Church. Bequests and Legacies have become an important source of Mission Funds for the Board, contributing significantly to the Board's "Mission Taonga". Bequests totalling \$2,200 were received in 2012.

## STAMP SALES

2012 was another good year for stamp sales, totalling \$18,684. For the first time in AMB history, a public sale was held in March (the "Stampede"), which attracted a number of serious collectors. In addition, over \$1,300 was raised in two International Auctions. We continue to be very grateful for the band of volunteers who process the stamps and make them suitable for sale.

## SUMMARY OF THE ANNUAL FINANCIAL RESULTS 2012

The total recorded income in 2012 was \$1.791 million. 2012 was a very challenging year as the difficult economic environment continued to cause financial uncertainty for many organisations. The final deficit for the year is \$18,311 compared to the original approved budget budgeted surplus of \$3,655. This is in line with a budget revision undertaken in February 2012 after the 2011 Annual Accounts were finalised, and reflected the reduced Tikanga Giving received in 2011. While the Board is pleased with the final 2012 result, given the difficult circumstances it faced, it will be working hard to return to a break-even position in 2013 and beyond.

The Board's Financial Position remains strong as reflected in the Balance Sheet and Cash position of the Board, with \$288,000 of General Funds and \$378,000 of funds from the sale of the Board's former property in Tawa on hand.



# COMINGS & GOINGS

## SHORT TERM MISSIONS

Tikanga Pakeha Missions Council Grants enabled the following teams to go on Short Term Missions in 2012. Read more stories on [www.angmissions.org.nz](http://www.angmissions.org.nz) under the news section.

### Taranaki and Taumarunui

In June 2012 a group of twenty-seven from Taranaki and Taumarunui left New Zealand to visit the Diocese of Kuching which takes in the whole of the Sarawak and the Sultanate of Brunei Darussalam on the island of Borneo. Sarawak is a wonderfully different country to New Zealand in just about every way. Culture, climate, language, landscape and wildlife.

*“Very often local people had very little English and we had quite challenging and new cultural experiences but, without exception, every one in the groups handled these new experiences well. I really enjoyed learning about how different the culture in Malaysia is compared to New Zealand; the language and the Church services, which are such a big part of community life, were truly uplifting and inspiring.” (Victoria aged 15)*

There were some points of similarity. We quickly discovered that visiting long houses and the form of welcome and meeting felt very familiar to those of us used to Marae. Undergirding our whole experience was the extraordinary gift of being with brothers and sisters in Christ. That common faith transcended language and culture. The visit has deepened the relationships between our two dioceses and established personal friendships that will endure.

### St Mary’s Whitby

In July 2012 a small group from St Mary’s Whitby and Samuel Marsden Whitby travelled to Fiji. This was a preliminary visit to hear the Talanoa (stories) of the people and to discuss face to face with the appropriate leaders what a parish to parish and school to school relationship may look like going forward.

### Ohariu Archdeaconry

60 volunteers worked tirelessly from June to September to improve St Andrew’s High School’s (Nuku’alofa, Tonga) resources and buildings. Volunteers came from Culverden, Christchurch, Wellington, Levin, Auckland, and Picton. They spent their days painting, cleaning, building, sanding, sorting, teaching and more.

## STAFF OVERSEAS VISITS

Visits by Anglican Missions staff to our partners overseas are important to continue building relationships and finding new ways to assist them.

### Executive Officer

In 2012, the Executive Officer visited Manila for a World Council of Churches meeting (March), Jordan (The School for Deaf – Salt and the Arab Episcopal School, Irbid) and participated in a three week course at St. George's College, Jerusalem (May), General Synod Fiji (July), St George's College Regional Meetings, Melbourne, Australia (July).

### Accountant

The Accountant, Glen Williams, travelled to PNG to assist the provincial Head Office with their accounts and build capacity amongst the Finance Team.

### Church Support Officer

In 2012, Mike Hawke visited Papua New Guinea speaking in the Diocese of Dogura, using a prepared booklet, produced by the AMB office entitled "Leading well, like Gaius, or badly like Diatrophes," based on 3 John.

He also took a group of 25 pilgrims to Jordan and Israel as part of the Anglican Missions Pilgrimage in June 2012.

*"The reality of the Pilgrimage was no let-down. It had nothing to do with beauty, grandeur, history or thought. It had to do with just being there, to absorb the atmosphere where, years ago, the stories from the Bible took place. Somehow, everything we knew from faith, and experience of the living God in our lives, sprung into sharper relief, became more real." (Graham)*



# MOBILISATION

## GLOBAL MISSION

The Board continues to focus on building relationships with parishes and rohe as it seeks to encourage our Church to engage with Global Mission. AMB is grateful for the Tikanga and Diocesan Mission Councils as they work hard promoting Global Mission and the work of AMB in their Tikanga and diocese, as well as helping ensure that the targets set by their Synods are met. In addition to the Tikanga Pakeha Missions Council (TPMC), Tikanga Pakeha also have Diocesan Mission Councils (DMC) who play a more 'hands on' role in their respective dioceses, working closely with AMB staff in the area of planning and organising deputations. DMCs also each nominate a member to TPMC.

## Church Support

In 2012 the CSO took 162 meetings with 147 nights away from home. Audiences ranged from 5 people to over 500. He led a pilgrimage to Israel and trained clergy in PNG (he was told 50 would turn up and over 300 workers arrived, some walking for three days in order to attend).

## PROMOTIONS

In addition to the increasing face to face contact with parishes through the CSO's visits, electronic media is now an integral part of our promotion and communication strategy.

- **Physical:** Mission Action, Partners in Prayer, Customised Displays for Parishes, Wall Planner, Lenten and Database Appeals, EO and CSO Parish Visitations.
- **Digital:** Mission Action, Partners in Prayer, Power Point Slideshows, Website, Electronic Newsletters, Facebook, Twitter.

## Electronic newsletter

Our electronic mail list is growing steadily for E-News which is distributed by email every two months. This enables AMB to keep parishes and individuals updated about mission stories between the print editions of Mission Action.

In 2012 we sent out 6 email campaigns updating our subscribers on the latest news, resources, and information available.

- **196 Individuals:** 47% Open Rate per campaign
- **269 Parishes:** 30% Open Rate per campaign
- **87 Mission Motivators:** 35% Open Rate per campaign
- Non-profit industry average for Open Rate is 21.4% so our lists are doing well.

## Website
